Why Teach Music?

Music is a Science – It is exact, specific; and, it demands exact acoustics. A conductor's full score is a chart, a graph which indicates frequencies, intensities, volume changes, melody, and harmony all at once and with the most exact control of time.

Music is Mathematical – It is rhythmically based on the subdivisions of time into fractions which must be done instantaneously, not worked out on paper.

Music is a Foreign Language – Most of the terms are in Italian, German, or French; and the notation is certainly not English, but a highly developed kind of shorthand that uses symbols to represent ideas. The semantics of music is the most complete and universal language.

Music is History – Music usually reflects the environment and times of its creation, often even the country and/or racial feeling.

Music is Physical Education – It requires fantastic coordination of fingers, hands, arms, lip, cheek, and facial muscles, in addition to extraordinary control of the diaphragmatic, back, stomach, and chest muscles, which respond instantly to the sound the ear hears and the mind interprets.

Music is all these things, but most of all, Music is art – It allows a human being to take all these dry, technically boring (but difficult) techniques and use them to create emotion. That is one thing science cannot duplicate: Humanism, feeling, emotion, call it what you will.

That Is Why We Teach Music!

Not, *because we expect you to major in music;*
 because we expect you to play or sing all your life;
 so you can relax; or
 so you can have fun;

But, *so you will be human;*
 so you will recognize beauty;
 so you will be sensitive;
 so you will be closer to an infinite beyond this world so you will have something to cling to;
 so you will have more love, more compassion, more gentleness, more good – in short, more life.

Of what value will it be to make a prosperous living unless you know how to live?





Concert Etiquette

One of the purposes for our concerts is to teach and reinforce proper behavior to our students, as the students learn from our example. The following are guidelines for appropriate concert behavior.

1. **Arrive on time.** If you are late, please wait until the end of the selection before entering the hall. In this way, latecomers trying to find a seat will not distract the performance.
2. **Listen quietly while the performance is taking place.** People in the audience and the performers are distracted by unnecessary talking and movement.
3. **Applause at the end of a performance.** Applause is the audience's manner of thanking the performers for their efforts. Applause should be used only at the completion of a piece of music and that is generally indicated when the conductor's arms are dropped to the side.
4. **Please do not wave or call out to performers.** Students have worked hard for weeks to prepare for performances. Please do not distract them from proper concert behavior.
5. **Stay for the entire performance.** If there is an emergency and one must leave before the final work, please wait until there is a break in the program.






