Music is a Science. It is exact, it is specific, and it demands exact acoustics. A conductor's score is a chart, a graph which indicates frequencies, intensities, volume changes, melody and harmony all at once and with the most exact control of time.

Music is mathematical. It is rhythmically based on the subdivisions of time into fractions which must be done instantaneously, not worked out on paper.

Music is a Toreign Language. Most of the terms are in Italian, German or French; and the notation is certainly not English - but a highly-developed kind of shorthand that uses symbols to represent ideas. The semantics of music is the most complete and universal language.

Music is all these things, but most of all, MUSIC IS QQT. It allows the human being to take all these dry, technically boring (but difficult) techniques and use them to create emotion. This one thing science cannot duplicate: humanism, feeling, emotion, call it what you will.

That is why we teach music!

Not because we expect you to major in music.

Not because we expect you to play or sing all your life.

But, so you will be human, so you will recognize beauty, so you will have something to cling to, so you will have more love, more compassion, more gentleness, more good - in short - more life.

Concert Etiquette

Please follow these guidelines for appropriate concert behavior:

- **1. Arrive on time.** If you are late, please wait until the end of the selection before entering the hall so that latecomers trying to find a seat will not distract the performers and other audience members.
- **2. Listen quietly while the performance is taking place.** Performers and audience members should never be distracted by unnecessary talking and movement.
- **3. Applause at the end of a performance.** Applause should be used only at the completion of a piece of music and that is generally indicated when the conductor's arms are dropped to the side.
- **4. Please do not wave or call out to performers.** Students have worked hard for weeks to prepare for performances. Please do not distract them with improper concert behavior. Applause, as noted above, is the best way to thank the performers.
- 5. Stay for the entire performance and wait until the end of the selection to leave. If there is an emergency and you must leave before the final performance, please wait until there is a break in the program.



Concert Band Program Notes

All Trails Lead West David Bobrowitz

David Bobrowitz received a Bachelor of Science degree from the Mannes College of Music in New York City, majoring in Trombone Performance under Simon Karasick. He went on to Teachers College, Columbia University, where he earned a master's degree in music education. He studied composition and arranging independently under the tutelage of Robert Russell Bennett.

Mr. Bobrowitz worked as a bass trombonist, pianist, composer and arranger in the New York area for more than 30 years. He retired from a prestigious Long Island school system in June of 2000, and now resides in Midlothian, Virginia. He has published works for band, string orchestra, orchestra, and chorus, and has amassed over 100 publications. Mr. Bobrowitz continues to be in demand as a performer, composer, and arranger.

It is the mid-1800's and American pioneers are readying themselves for the long trip out west. Their covered wagons are filled with food, furniture, and everything they need to start a new life. Although the trip is filled with many dangers, hundreds of thousands of people risk everything to start life anew in the wide-open west. All Trails Lead West captures the spirit and beauty of the old west, and the courage of the pioneers who settled the land.

All Trails Lead West is a Clarence Bands premiere.

Canterbury Chorale Jan Van der Roost

(Composer notes for Jan Van der Roost are included on page 12.)

This quiet piece with its broad tones was originally written for brass band on request of Robert Leveugle, chairman of the composer's own band, Brass Band Midden Brabant. The direct cause was a visit to the beautiful cathedral of the English city Canterbury, in which so many fine compositions sounded throughout the centuries. Later, Jan Van der Roost rescored this piece for symphonic wind band, exploring the full richness of colors of this ensemble. Besides solo phrases for several instruments, there are some massive tutti passages making the wind orchestra sound like a majestic organ.

Our Heritage March Karl King

Karl Lawrence King began his long career in music at the age of 11 when he bought a cornet with money earned by selling newspapers. He was born in Paintersville, Ohio in 1891, but his family moved to Canton, Ohio in 1902, and it was there that he began lessons on the cornet. He soon exchanged that instrument for a euphonium, which he played first in the Canton "Marine" Band (made up of boys his own age) and later in the local Thayer Military Band.

In 1917 he began a two-year tour as bandmaster with Barnum and Bailey's "Greatest Show on Earth," taking along his wife, who played calliope with the circus. In 1920, King moved his publishing firm to Fort Dodge, Iowa, where he conducted the Fort Dodge Municipal Band for the next 51 years. During his long tenure, it became one of the nation's best-known bands, giving two concerts each week during the summer, pioneering radio broadcasts over Station WHO in Des Moines, and playing at almost every Iowa State Fair since 1920. During that time, he also worked with countless school bands and was one of the founders of the American Bandmasters Association; he was elected president of the ABA in 1938.

King composed nearly 300 works, including serenades, overtures, rags, intermezzos, waltzes, and galops, as well as his 188 famous marches.

Our Heritage March is one of Karl King's nicest 'easier' marches, perfect for contest or concert performances. Mr. Swearingen's skillful arrangement is articulated to bring out the best performance by bands. This arrangement has been faithfully re-scored to accommodate modern instrumentation and incorporate performance practices of classic march style.

Symphonic Band Program Notes

Invercargill Alex F. Lithgow

Alex F. Lithgow, the so-called March King of the Antipodes (Australia and New Zealand), was born in Glasgow, Scotland, in 1870; his family moved to Invercargill, New Zealand, when he was six years old. New Zealand had been made a British crown colony in 1840, gold was discovered in 1861, and many of the emigrants from Scotland and England who were attracted by the two events took their instruments and music along. Alex began studying cornet at age nine and violin at 11. He was admitted to the Invercargill Garrison Band when he was only 11. At 16 he became the principal cornet soloist, and four years later, after winning the cornet solo championship at the first national band contest (in Dunedin, 1890), he was promoted to bandmaster. Lithgow's winning record as a bandmaster (at age 30) was nine first prizes, two seconds, one third, and two fourths. In addition to cornet, he was also an excellent violinist, and, beginning when he was 15, he worked with several orchestras during his career.

After Lithgow moved to Launceston, Tasmania to conduct the St. Joseph's Band, his brother, Tom, became leader of the Invercargill Garrison Band. With the city preparing to host the approaching New Zealand band contest in 1909, the local organizing committee asked Tom Lithgow to request a new test march from his brother for the competition. Fortunately, the composer had a march which he had already completed but which had been rejected by Edward Lyons Music Publishing Co. of Melbourne as 'not worth publishing'. The dedication on the score reads "To Invercargill, the southernmost city in New Zealand (end of the world) and its citizens as a memento of many pleasant years spent there in my boyhood."

Lithgow's *Invercargill March* became a worldwide success after an arrangement for wind band by L.P. Laurendean was published by Carl Fisher in 1913. However, the composer's royalties for that one "hit" did not provide a living for his family.

Determined to continue composing, he worked as a printer for the *Examiner* newspaper by day and composed his music at night. The strenuous schedule soon took its toll; he became an invalid and died in 1929, leaving his widow, one son, and two daughters. Highly respected as a cornetist, composer, and conductor and beloved as a kind and patient person, Lithgow's funeral service was attended by thousands of people who walked the three miles to the cemetery. Since his death, memorial plaques have been erected in both Tasmania and New Zealand.

Invercargill March was previously performed in 1976.

Amina (Spanish March) Paul Lincke

Composer Carl Paul Lincke (November 7, 1866 – September 3, 1946) was a German composer and theater conductor. He is considered the "father" of the Berlin operetta. His well-known compositions include "*Berliner Luft*" ("*Berlin Air*"), the unofficial anthem of *Berlin*, from his operetta *Frau Luna*, and "*The Glow Worm*", from his operetta *Lysistrata*.

Lincke was born on November 7, 1866 in the Jungfernbrücke district of Berlin. He was the son of magistrate August Lincke and his wife Emilie. His father played the violin in several small orchestras. When Paul was only five years old his father died. Emilie moved with her three children to Adalvertstage and later to Eisenbahnstrage, near Lausitzer Platz.

Lincke's early musical inclinations were towards military music. His mother sent him after the completion of secondary school education to Wittenberge. Here he was trained in the Wittenberg City Band under Rudolf Kleinow as a bassoonist. He also learned to play the tenor horn, the drums, the piano, and the violin.

In 1943 Lincke toured Marienbad, Bohemia, to conduct *Frau Luna*, whose first performance in 1899 is now regarded as the birth of the Berlin operetta. During his absence, his house and his music publisher in Berlin were bombed. Lincke also composed the wedding dance played in the 1997 movie *Titanic*. It is played while the ship is going down and in the dining room in earlier scenes.

Lincke's ailing health was worsened by the climate there, and he moved again to Hahnenklee. He died there shortly before his 80th birthday. His funeral was held in Hahnenklee, where his grave is still maintained today.

This fiery Spanish March gives students the opportunity to play in a standard march format in a lighter style. All of the winds are given melodic material, making it fun and challenging to play. The key change at the trio sounds abrupt which adds interest to the piece.

Rain Brian Balmages

Brian Balmages (b. 1975) is an active composer, conductor, producer and performer. He received his bachelor's degree in music from James Madison University and his master's degree from the University of Miami in Florida. Mr. Balmages's works for symphonic band, orchestra, and brass have been performed throughout the world, including College Band Directors National and Regional Conferences, the Midwest Clinic, and the International Tuba/Euphonium Conference, the International Trombone Festival, and the International Trumpet Guild Conference. His active schedule of commissions has included groups ranging from elementary schools to professional ensembles, including the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, Miami Symphony Orchestra, he University of Miami Wind Ensemble, Dominion Brass, and others. He has also enjoyed world premieres in his prestigious venues including Carnegie Hall.

As a conductor, Mr. Balmages enjoys engagements with numerous honor bands, university groups, and professional ensembles throughout the country. Notable guest conducting appearances have included the Midwest Clinic, College Band Directors Regional Conference, Mid-Atlantic Wind Conductors Conference, the Atlantic Classical Orchestra Brass Ensemble, and Meyerhoff Symphony Hall in Baltimore. He has also served as an adjunct professor of instrumental conducting and Director of the Symphonic Band at Towson University in Maryland. Currently, Mr. Balmages is the Director of Instrumental Publications for The FJH Music Company Inc. in Fort Lauderdale, Florida. He resides in Baltimore with his wife, Lisa, and their son, Jacob.

Rain is a gentle work with a great deal of expressiveness. It paints a picture of a quiet rainfall with distant rolling thunder. "The sound of droplets hitting the ground often puts me at ease for a reason I cannot adequately describe. For this reason, I chose to explain my thoughts through music, which has always been a more powerful means of expression for me than words.

The melodic and harmonic lines convey the complexity of rain—the sadness it brings to some, the calmness it brings to others, and its ability to rejuvenate; the soft droplets outside our window that can be so relaxing yet can also be the cause of a raging river. It is my hope that groups will experience a wide range of emotions as they rehearse and perform this work."

Rain was previously performed in 2018.

Flashing Winds Jan Van der Roost

Jan Van der Roost is an important member of the generation of young European composers whose music helped to enrich the wind band repertoire with interesting, original compositions. Although relatively unknown a few years ago, his works are now performed in numerous nations and composes only commissioned pieces.

Jan (Frans Joseph) Van der Roost's father was a conductor of amateur ensembles; his mother sang in the local choir. While Jan was still young, he became interested in the music and the composers associated with wind, fanfare, and brass bands. He began arranging for small ensembles and earned a triple laureate diploma for trombone, music history, and music education at the Lemmens Institute in Leuven, Belgium, in 1979. He then continued his advanced studies, culminating in a music diploma at the Royal Conservatory of Ghent in 1982 and a composition diploma at the Royal Flemish Conservatory in Antwerp in 1989. In 1983, Van der Roost became a teacher of counterpoint and fugue at the Lemmens Institute. In 1984 he was appointed conductor of the well-known Midden Brabant Brass Band, and in 1991 he became conductor of the Lemmens Conservatory Symphonic Band.

He has served as a great conductor and adjudicator at international music festivals in more than 20 countries. He and his wife, Bernadette (Johnson), are the parents of Bart, Els, Leen, and Tom. The live in Kontich, Belgium.

This flashing piece was commissioned by "Het muziekverbond van West-Vlaanderen" and is dedicated to the "Arlequino" youth band. Colourfully and effectually instrumentated, this piece speeds towards its finale without any tempo changes. The chord-blocks, which characterized the introduction, unite this virtuoso piece by reappearing in the end.

Flashing Winds was previously performed in 2019.

Biographies

Andrea (Flagler) Runfola is a 1990 Newfane High School Graduate and received bachelor's Degrees in both clarinet performance and music education with an additional major on the oboe and bassoon from the State University College at Fredonia 1994. In 1999, Ms. Runfola received a master's degree in Music Education from the Eastman School of Music.

Ms. Runfola is active as an educator and performer. She has been a teacher in the Clarence School District for twenty-nine years. Eight of those years were spent teaching elementary instrumental music and band and 16 years were spent teaching 6th,7th and 8th grade woodwinds and band. Currently, she teaches woodwind lessons at the high school and Ledgeview Elementary School, the High School Symphonic Band, and Co-directs the High School Concert Band. Ms. Runfola's bands have consistently received Gold and Gold with Distinction ratings at NYSSMA Major's Festivals. She is involved with the Erie County Music Educators Association as a concert coordinator, All-State judge, All-State selection committee, clinician, chairman, mentor, guest conductor and served on the ECMEA Board of Directors for 8 years. In 2017, she was awarded the BPO/ECMEA Excellence in Music Education Award. In addition, she is a member of several music organizations including NYSSMA, NYSBDA, Phi Beta Mu, the Buffalo Musicians Union, and Sigma Alpha Iota. In March 2013, Ms. Runfola lead the pit orchestra for Clarence High School's production of "Chicago". In April 2013, "Chicago" won the Kenny Award for "Best Musical" and Ms. Runfola's pit orchestra won for "Best Orchestra".

Ms. Runfola has performed with the Buffalo Philharmonic, at Artpark, Shea's Performing Arts Center, for Opera Sacra, Buffalo Opera Unlimited, "Bach and Beyond" under the direction of Grant Cooper, the Clarence Summer Orchestra as principal clarinetist and soloist, and several community ensembles. She has been a guest soloist with the Buffalo Philharmonic twice, the Clarence Summer Orchestra where she is currently principal clarinet, and the Cheektowaga Symphony Orchestra. She has performed with Peter Cetera; former front man in the group Chicago, the Three Irish Tenors, Lou Gramm of Foreigner, and Mickey Thomas of Jefferson Starship and "The Who". She performed on alto saxophone and clarinet for "Guys and Dolls" and "The Music Man" at Fredonia College, and performed in the orchestra pit at Artpark for "Cinderella", "The Sound of Music" (and at Shea's) "Peter Pan" and "Mary Poppins".

Other performances include "Madame Butterfly", "The Magic Flute", "Sweeney Todd", and played clarinet and bass clarinet for Shea's Touring production of "The Phantom of the Opera" in 2018, and "My Fair Lady" in 2022.



Louis Vitello is presently in his twenty-seventh year of teaching at Clarence High School where he serves as the conductor of the Wind Ensemble, co-conductor of the Concert Band, and Chairman of the Clarence Central School District Music Department. His responsibilities also include teaching lessons and AP Music Theory, advising the Drama Club, and directing the fall play and high school musical.

Mr. Vitello received his bachelor's degree in Music Education and his master's degree in Instrumental Conducting from the University at Buffalo. While pursuing his master's degree, he was a teaching assistant to the Director of Bands, which included serving as the Associate Conductor of the UB Wind Ensemble, University Symphonic Band, and co-director of the UB Pep Band. In addition, he was a staff assistant conductor for the former Greater Buffalo Opera Company, was co-founder and director of the Western New York Youth Wind Ensemble, and has guest conducted the Greater Buffalo Youth Orchestra along with all-county honor bands in the Western New York area and across New York State. His conducting teachers have included Sarah McKoin, Charles Peltz, Gary Burgess, Harold Farberman (Conductor's Institute), and William Silvester.

Clarence Ensembles under Mr. Vitello's direction have performed at the New York State School Music Association Conference (2022), American Concert Band Association Annual Conference (2018), the New York State Band Director's Association Annual Symposium (2014 & 2010), presented clinics at the New York State School Music Association Conference (2000) & the New York State Band Director's Association Regional Workshop (2012); and have commissioned and/or premiered new works for wind band. These pieces include Persis Parshall Vehar's Pan American Overture (2001). Stephen Melillo's Way (2011), 21: Won Michael Vertoske's Madrid (2011), David Maslanka's Hymn for World Peace (2015), Mellilo's Ark of the Covenant and In the Darkest Darkness (2018). Furthermore, in 2019, he was selected as the BPO/ECMEA Outstanding Music Educator.

Mr. Vitello is a member of the National Association for Music Education, New York State School Music Association, Erie County Music Educators Association, Who's Who Among American Teachers, New York State Band Directors Association, Pi Kappa Lambda National Music Honor Society, and is an honorary member of the Kappa Kappa Psi National Band Fraternity.

Band Trips—From Syracuse to Chicago, and even down to Florida, our bands and directors present clinics and perform in a wide variety of venues. Every two years, band students have the opportunity for travel, either to perform at Walt Disney World, or to experience a culture-focused trip to New York City where they take in several shows over the course of a four-day visit.

<u>Annual Kleinhans Concert</u>—Each year, we are able to provide our band students the opportunity to perform at Kleinhans Music Hall. This special evening, paid for completely by the Band Booster Club, caps off a year of hard work and showcases our fine music program.

Spectrum Concert—To culminate each year of music-making, this amazing evening features performances by each of the bands in the Clarence Central School District, from fourth through twelfth grade. As the upperclassmen perform one last time, they reflect on their musical growth. This vivid display of impressive musicianship also instills high level goals in the younger students and inspires them to practice!

Annual Band Banquet—All band students and the parents of seniors are invited to attend our always enjoyable Band Banquet, planned and partially subsidized by the Band Boosters. Students reminisce, awards are presented, and tears are shed as seniors say good-bye. This popular annual event is a great way to wrap up the year!



Summer Band Concert Refreshment Stand—The Band Booster Club sells refreshments during the evening concerts in the Clarence Town Park. Based on profits for the entire series, donations are made to the accounts of students whose families have participated in running the stand.



Summer Band Pizza Party—Following the Clarence Summer Band Concert held in Clarence Town Park in July, the Band Boosters provide pizza and wings for all the participants. Alumni are invited to participate in the rehearsals and concert.



<u>Annual Sub Sale</u>—The Sub Sale is a longstanding tradition at CHS and it is held on a Saturday in September. Inasmuch as the money raised benefits all CHS band students, including making the Kleinhans concert possible, student participation is mandatory. Due to the scope of this endeavor, we need considerable parental involvement.



<u>Chiavetta's Chicken Barbecue</u>—An annual fall event, our chicken barbecue enables band students to earn money toward band trips. In past years, students have sold upward of 1,000 dinners and have earned considerable sums for band accounts!



<u>Holiday Wreath/Poinsettia Sale</u> – This fundraiser is held in November with plant pick up in December just in time for the holidays. A variety of poinsettias are offered along with wreaths and centerpieces. Students who participate earn money towards future tours.

We are very proud of the musicians on the stage this evening and the thousands of former Clarence Band students who came before them. Many of our graduates continue to study music education and/or music performance in college, as well as participate in musical ensembles at the collegiate level for their own enjoyment. Many have kept music in their lives after college by playing in community bands and orchestras. All Clarence Band students learn life-long skills of playing an instrument and develop a deep appreciation of many varieties of repertoire.
