The Clarence Bands

The Clarence High School Bands have long enjoyed a national reputation for musical excellence and worthy educational achievements. Our guest appearances at state and international music conferences; our local concerts; our national tours; our recordings; the numerous Clarence students who appear at county, regional, state and national music festivals: these have all led to conductors, audiences, music educators, and students from other schools to expect exceptionally high levels of musical performance and personal behavior from the Clarence High School Bands.

It is the purpose of the music department to maintain this worthy tradition while increasing the musical sensitivity and knowledge of our band members and stimulating character growth through cooperative effort, self-discipline, responsibility, patience, attention to detail, and the desire for perfection. We believe that each student, as a direct result of his/her full participation in the Clarence Music Program, will be a lifelong, independent, comprehensive musician.

Student Responsibilities

A proper attitude and a strong concept of responsibility to one's self and to the ensemble are vital to our program. The quality of the band is severely limited when one individual fails to fulfill his/her responsibilities. The following expectations have proven valuable to guide and enforce the values we seek.

- Follow the codes of conduct established by Clarence High School and the Clarence School District
- Follow guidelines laid out in subsequent sections of this handbook.
- Show respect for your teachers, fellow students, the equipment and the facilities that are provided for your use.
- Show respect for your ensemble by practicing and improving your musical skills.
- Maintain punctual and regular attendance at lessons, rehearsals, sectionals and performances.

Section A: Lessons

Weekly instrumental lessons occur on a rotating basis, so a student will not need to miss the same period on a frequent basis. (It is the student's responsibility to inform the teacher whose class they will miss for music lesson. Students are still responsible for making up all missed work.).

If a student encounters a teacher who does not allow him or her to miss class to attend a lesson, or a teacher who makes it unusually difficult to be excused from class, please inform your lesson teacher immediately.

Please treat each lesson as you would any other academic class. Always be on time. This means in your seat, already warmed up, with the proper music, mutes, reeds, valve oil, and pencil by the time the lesson teacher is ready to begin. A pencil is always necessary at every lesson and rehearsal. Mark your music (specifically, band music) neatly and thoroughly according to the lesson teacher's comments. Remember that others will need to use this same music in future years.

Section B: Rehearsals

Band rehearsals occur daily, and should be treated as any other academic course, including:

- Always be on time. This means; in your seat, already warmed up, with the proper music, mutes, reeds, valve oil, and pencil by the time the conductor is ready to begin.
- All music must be adequately prepared before the rehearsal begins and private Practice time for this music must be a part of the student's daily routine.
- Each student should have his/her own copy of all music that is being performed. Each student must have his/her own band folder to keep music in to prevent damage. If a student doesn't have a folder, he/she is responsible for purchasing one through the music office. It is the individual's responsibility to have the proper music at all rehearsals.
- A pencil is always necessary at every rehearsal. Mark your music neatly and Thoroughly according to the conductor's comments. Remember that others will need to use this same music in future years. Band pencils are available in the band room.

Extra rehearsals and sectionals are scheduled regularly. They are mandatory and are an extension of the academic class. Students and faculty will be given notice as far in advance as possible.

Dress Rehearsals are scheduled on an evening prior to concert performances and are clearly indicated on the Music Department Calendar. Dress rehearsal serves as a “final review” for the subsequent concert (see Section C, below) and student attendance is mandatory.

Section C: Concerts/Performances

Concerts are considered final, performance based “projects” which conclude the preparation time leading up to them. Each concert, therefore, will be evaluated as a critical part of the marking period grade. Attendance is mandatory.

Section D: Uniforms

The band uniform is to be worn with pride. All band members are expected to wear the entire uniform throughout the length of a given musical event. At no time should a student appear in partial uniform while an event is in progress, including directly before or after the event. The appropriate band uniform consists of:

Men

Black Tails Tuxedo and Pants
White Tuxedo Shirt - pleated, french collar style *
Pique White Bow Tie and Vest **
Black Socks
Black Shoes – Non-Rubber Soles
Limited Cologne

Women

Black Concert Dress
Black Hosiery Black Shoes
Simple Jewelry
Limited Perfume

Inappropriate accessories, makeup and/or hair color will not be tolerated. Band directors reserve the right to withhold a student from a performance for failure to follow these guidelines.

Male band members should see Mr. Vitello at least one month prior to the first concert performance to be issued a tuxedo jacket and pants. Female band members should see Mrs. Rollo for their dresses.

All band uniforms **must** be handed in at the last concert (Spectrum) so they can be dry-cleaned. If they are not handed in at that time, you are responsible for your own dry-cleaning.

If any loss or damage to concert uniform assigned should occur, it will be the student's responsibility to pay purchase price of said uniform.

Section E: Care of Equipment

Students are financially responsible for all school equipment issued to them. The band uniform must be properly cared for and returned at the end of the school year. All band music must also be returned. Each student must purchase his or her own mouthpiece when using a school instrument and each percussion student must own his or her own sticks, mallets, and carrying case. Please contact Mr. Vitello and/or Ms. Runfolo for information on the appropriate mouthpiece and percussion equipment to buy.

The cost of any damage caused by negligence will be borne by the student.

No student will play another's instrument or open their case without that student's permission.

All pianos, percussion equipment, chairs, music stands, and other school owned instruments are to be treated with great care and used only by authorized students.

Section F: Facilities

We are fortunate to have excellent facilities in the music area, and all students must treat them with care and respect. The following guidelines will be followed:

- No food, gum or drink of any sort will be allowed in the blue room, percussion room, or rear storage room at any time.
- The band room is not a lounge. It may be used for practice and band related activities during non-ensemble periods at the discretion of the lesson teacher.

Students wishing to utilize practice rooms during the school day may do so only if it is during a study hall or lunch, and only with permission and a pass from one of the band directors. Practice rooms are to be used exclusively for instrumental practice.

Section G: Grading

Evaluation of each student's achievement in the Band Program is derived in several ways. Effort, promptness, practice, and performance are all important considerations in determining the student's grade. Specifically, these components are:

1. Weekly Music Lessons – see Section A
2. Daily Band Rehearsals – see Section B
3. Extra Rehearsals – see Section B
4. Sectional Rehearsals – see Section B
5. Dress Rehearsals – see Section B
6. Concert Performances – see Section C
7. Tuning Requirement / Percussion Project Requirement – see below
8. Concert Attendance Write-up (one per semester) – see below
9. Listening Assignments – see below

Important: Students only receive a 95 if they complete the minimum requirements:

- required # of lessons per marking period;
- one tuner sheet;
- one concert attendance per semester;

Each student receives a grading sheet to keep track of each marking period. They will turn this in at the end of every marking period.

Tuning Requirement

The quality of the performance is very much related to intonation, and intonation is very much related to the amount of time the student spends working with a tuner. All band members are required to make frequent use of the tuners. A minimum of one tuner sheet must be completed each marking period during a lesson with your lesson teacher.

One additional sheet will be optional for an extra credit point per marking period.

Students are encouraged to download tuner apps on their phones (i.e. clear tune). Metronome apps are also strongly encouraged.

Failure to complete this tuning requirement will result in a grade reduction of 20 points for the marking period.

Concert Attendance

Each student is required to attend one concert outside of the Clarence District (high school level or higher) per semester. A brief write-up must be turned in within one week of the attended concert. These sheets are available in the band room. Various concerts are announced by the directors and posted in the band room throughout the semester. Failure to complete this concert attendance requirement will result in a grade reduction of 5 points at the end of the semester (second marking period or fourth marking period).

Listening Assignments

Occasionally, band directors may request that students spend time listening to recordings of works they are performing, while studying the scores of the pieces. These assignments will be made with sufficient notice of their due dates. Failure to complete this listening assignment will result in a grade reduction of 5 points for the marking period.

Grade Point Additions

The following extra points may be earned during each marking period. These points will be added “on the top” of an individual’s regular average for that marking period.

Plus 5	For maintaining a Chamber Ensemble that meets weekly and is assisted by a faculty coach, approved by your band director
Plus 5	For an A+ or OUTSTANDING rating earned on a Level VI (Level V for 9th graders) solo or ensemble performance. Four points for an A. Three points for an A-
Plus 5	For an A+ or OUTSTANDING rating earned on a Level V (Level IV for 9th graders) solo or ensemble performance. Three points for an A. Two points for an A-

Plus 5	For an A+ or OUTSTANDING rating earned on a Level IV solo or ensemble performance. Two points for an A. One point for an A-
Plus 5	For participating in the NYSSMA All-State, All-Eastern, or National MENC Band or Orchestra
Plus 5	For participating in the NYSSMA Sectional All-State Band or Orchestra
Plus 5	For participating in the ECMEA All-County Band or Orchestra (Junior and Senior High Festivals)
Plus 2	For each lesson attended beyond the minimum for the marking period
Plus 1	For an additional tuner sheet
Plus 1	For each additional concert attended and write-up beyond the minimum required (maximum of 5)

Grade Point Reductions

Students may also lose points on their grade average for a Marking Period as follows:

- Minus 20 For failure to complete tuning/percussion project requirement
- Minus 5 For failure to complete concert attendance requirement
- Minus 5 For failure to complete listening assignments
- Zero 0 Will be given as a lesson grade for each weekly lesson below minimum required for the marking period (see Section A)

Annual Band Auditions

In the spring of each year, auditions take place to identify the ensemble in which each student will participate the following school year. Students should understand the importance of the audition process and prepare accordingly. All audition materials are distributed at least one month prior to the actual audition. Questions about the audition process should be directed to your band director. On occasion, students may be asked to perform in more than one ensemble based on need. The students must maintain all requirements with the 1st assigned group or the student will be removed from the secondary ensemble.
